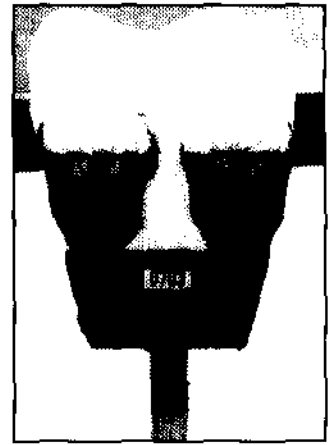

**Minutes Stockade Association
Meeting January 7, 2003**

President Joe Fava opened the meeting at 7:05pm at the home of member Ruth Harvey. Other Board members present included Meredith Anker, Bob Briber, Connie Colangelo, Diane DeMeo, Lyn Gordon, Peter Rumora, Susanna Sherwood, and Eli Taub. Dale Miller was present as a guest. Joe asked that Brad send a letter to Feibes and Schmitt thanking them for the use of their space at earlier meetings.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved as distributed, and Meredith's Treasurer's report, that we have \$7,533.74 in the checking account, was accepted. It was MSP that we keep a thousand dollars in the checking account and move the rest into CDs. Joe Fava asked the Board to discuss appropriate investment projects at the next meeting.

The group discussed the recent Christmas season events, which were very successful and are described elsewhere in this issue. The "Kerst Kermis" Christmas bazaar at the VanDyck was a great success. 130 people attended, and the vendors were very pleased. The event raised \$200 for the Association. Next year, with more publicity, it could do even better. Joe asked Diane if she would send thank you notes to the musicians who performed, if she hadn't already done so.

The free Brunch for Stockaders is scheduled for February 16, 11 to 1, at Schenectady Civic Players. Peter prepared a careful list of the responsibilities for the event. We expect around 125 people, and spent about \$300 for the event last year.

Dale Miller then handed out maps of current Stockade traffic patterns, and alternative patterns that he, Joe and others had discussed. Our current traffic pattern contains potential disasters. It invites

non-local drivers seeking a shortcut to speed through our residential area. The board plans to bring the subject to the March general meeting.

**Stockade Association
General Meeting January 16, 2003**

Joe Fava called this meeting of the Stockade Association to order at 7:35pm, in the meeting room of the Historical Society. About 30 people were present. He turned the meeting over to Vice-President Eli Taub, who introduced Public Safety Commissioner Daniel Boyle and Police Chief Mike Geraci. Joe also introduced Peter Guiderelli, Karen Johnson and Peter Polachek, in the audience.

Commissioner Boyle, who began work in July, said he is determined to take a fresh look at the Police and Fire Departments, and to talk with and listen to the community. He said he had been to meetings virtually every night. He said he wants both Departments to be very open and accessible to the people, and wants the public convinced that every penny spent is spent wisely.

Chief Geraci said the police department has 160 officers and 30 to 40 civilians. Sounds like a lot, he said, but spread over three shifts, 7 days a week, and with nearly 100,000 calls for service a year, it really isn't a lot. He described their Patrol, Investigation, and Traffic Safety Divisions and efforts in drug enforcement and anti-terrorism work. He said the Department is trying to be as pro-active as it can be and said, "We're really sincere in our desire to work with you."

Mr. Boyle and Chief Geraci said they have a meeting scheduled with the Gazette editorial board, and hope to convince them as well that they are sincere and very interested in turning the Departments around to serve the public effectively.

In response to a question about

Neighborhood Watch, Chief Geraci said it would be a nice fit for the Stockade. He said they will assign a Sergeant to oversee Neighborhood Watch efforts, but he said you must have neighbors who are willing to do the work.

In response to a question, about overtime, he said they have put two more officers on the streets in an effort to reduce OT; that it is often the younger officers who are paid the overtime, and the press coverage of the OT issue has not been balanced or fair.

The question was asked, "How many officers do you need?" He said they are doing the job now with 160. He said we understand the financial constraints, and we have to be realistic.

The Board then approved the minutes of the previous meeting, and heard from Meredith that we have \$7,588.32 in checking and about \$19,400 in CDs. Joe said he is looking seriously for effective ways to spend some of that money on projects to improve the Stockade, and asked members to suggest ideas.

Connie Colangelo and Diane DeMeo described the Christmas events at some length; an article by Connie identifying some of the many people who helped is elsewhere in this *SPY*.

Lyn Gordon gave a report about the forthcoming Walkabout, Sept 20. She said the Cultural Tourism Committee of the CofC is arranging for credit-card charging, which will help greatly with the Walkabout. The whole Stockade is on display that day, she said, and it will be very important that streets, front steps, stoops, gardens and all be cleaned up for the visitors.

Peter Rumora described plans for the neighborhood, free brunch on February 16, two days after Valentine's Day, in the Civic Players building from 11 to 1. He said that as an addition this year, at 1:30 they will have a "show and tell," in which Stockaders can read a short love poem, tell a story, sing a song, or anyway they choose, celebrate the day.

Peter also described a plan he had proposed and the Board is working on, to get the streets of the Stockade swept on a regular basis. He said they are filthy now, and need regular, professional sweeping.

Joe said the Board is working on a new set of traffic patterns for the area, to eliminate the use of our streets by non-locals as speedways to shortcut their routes from Rte 890 to Erie Blvd, or the opposite direction. He said the Board plans to bring it to the next General Meeting in March.

Lyn Gordon, Susanna Sherwood and Bob Briber were elected to the nominating committee, to present a slate of officers for election at the May meeting.

Joe said the St. Andrews Society has approached the Board regarding their 200th anniversary celebration. They want to include the Stockade with a march on April 6. He said we would hear more about that in the future.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:30. The next general meeting is scheduled for **Thursday, March 20, 2003**.

All of our homes are part of the city's Stockade Historic District. As such we are bound by the city's codes and regulations regarding such districts. Specifically, the Code says:

No person shall carry out any exterior alteration, restoration, repair, repainting, reconstruction, demolition, new construction or moving of an historic site or structure or property that results in any physical change to buildings, structures, or historic resources within the districts, nor shall any person make any material change in the appearance of such a property, its light fixtures, signs, roofs, steps, railings, sidewalks, fences, paving or other exterior elements visible from a public right-of-way which affect the appearance and cohesiveness of the Historic District or historic site or structure, without first obtaining a certificate or approval from the Commission. Any and all such action shall require the prior approval of the Commission, regardless of whether a building permit is required.

Nothing shall be construed to prevent the ordinary maintenance and repair of any exterior architectural feature of a historic site or structure or property within an Historic District which does not involve a change in design, material, color or outward appearance.

So it's pretty straightforward. If in any way what you are proposing to do changes any aspect of the exterior appearance of your house, yard or property that can be seen from any public street, alley or sidewalk, it requires review by the Historic Commission. The Commission meets once a month on a Monday night to publicly review applications. Some applications, such as for simple roofing or repainting projects can be reviewed by the city's planning department without a formal Commission review. Applications are available from the city planners in the Development Office, Room 14, City Hall. Further information can be obtained from the same office at 382-5147. There are no fees for Historic Commission applications and reviews.
