Pick up the first 2003 quarterly issue of *Better Homes & Gardens, Special Interest Publications*, “Simply Perfect Small Space Gardens.” You will see the landscape design work of Mark J. **Stockade Association Board Meeting
Minutes 2/04/03**

President Joe Fava called this meeting to order at 7:10 pm at the home of Bob and Sylvie Briber. In addition to Joe and Bob, Meredith Anker, Connie Colangelo, Brad Fisher, Lyn Gordon, Ruth Harvey, Peter Rumora and Susanna Sherwood were present. Sylvie Briber, Kim Mabee and Dale Miller attended as guests. The minutes of the previous meeting were approved as distributed and the Treasurer's report, that we have \$7707.41 in checking and \$19,417.95 in CDs, was accepted.

The group discussed how to increase membership. Joe said he gets dozens of calls – many of them from neighbors who are not members of the Association - asking him to do this or that service for them. The Board urged him ask the callers if they are a member *before* he embarks on any major effort. Joe and Sylvie asked for up-to-date copies of the membership list. Joe said he, with help from Brad, would write an article for the SPY urging neighbors to join, and pointing out the reasons they should.

Dale Miller of Green St. discussed suggestions for traffic changes to alleviate the speeding problem. A major feature of one plan would involve closing the circle around the Indian to through traffic and reversing the direction of No. Ferry. Then, cars coming east (from Rte 890 and SCCC) on Washington and Front would have to go back out to Union St on No. Ferry, and their shortcut would disappear. Cars coming west on Front (from Freeman's Bridge road) would have to turn and go back out Green, thus defeating their shortcut. "*Presto*," Dale said, in a few weeks the problem would be solved, and perhaps the area around the Indian could be turned into a little park, as a gathering place for Stockaders.

Several people expressed reservations: Such a plan, they felt, would divide the Stockade into two groups because driving around in the Stockade would be more complicated, and easy interchange among Stockaders would be frustrated. Joe urged, after much discussion, that an article seeking neighbors' input should be put in the SPY. Perhaps most people are not as concerned as the Board is, or perhaps describing the problem will stimulate good ideas from readers. Dale and Bob agreed to write such an article. Joe and Dale will meet with Milt Mitchell to discuss the problem and explore various solutions

There did seem to be general consensus that blocking Washington Ave. near SCCC, so through traffic would not be permitted, and making the short dead end that would remain on Washington into a two way street, would be a good first step.

Lyn, Kim and Sylvie then reported on the Walkabout, which is going well. The Board approved allocating \$100 to the Cultural Tourism committee to help establish a website able to take credit card charges for tickets. Then, after much discussion, the group voted 6 to 2 to approve an agreement among the Association, the Historical Society and Downtown Schenectady Improvement Corp., for one year, that would obligate the Association to "take major responsibility for entertainment, securing homes for the tour and all it entails, writing and producing the ticket/program, and coordinating ad sales in that program to increase revenue." Similar obligations are spelled out for the other two organizations.

Joe reported that plans are progressing well on the Gillette House, and major external work should be completed by fall. The building will be leased to the Mohawk Valley Historic Corridor, and probably will contain their offices, a visitor center, a confer-

ence room, a small museum, and possibly an office for the Association. The exterior, the Ladd parking lot and the building next door will also be renovated. The Board expressed great interest in the renovations, and voted to support the effort as a major project of the Association – for Walkabout moneys and other funds.

Peter and the group reviewed plans for the Brunch on February 16.

Joe reported that the Dutch Reformed Church has purchased the Knights of Columbus building and Shaunessy Hall. The plan is to tear down Shaunessy Hall for parking and for Jack MacDonald to use the K of C building for offices of his engineering firm. The group also discussed various other buildings in the Stockade.

Brad read several letters he had written, e.g., thanking Feibes and Schmitt for use of their offices, recommending Jennifer Wells for a position, etc. The group expressed its appreciation.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:25. **The March 4 meeting – unless plans are changed – will be held at Ruth Harvey's home.**

WHAT'S BREWIN' AT THE VAN DYCK?

Those of us who were at the Schenectady Heritage Foundation's dedication of the Stockade Monuments will not forget Tom Rynasko's determination to make our celebration a success. In a heartbeat Tom rearranged everything to be held inside due to a torrential downpour. Clearing the stage, setting up mikes and instructing staff of the changes, the costumed participants paraded up the stairs, as if planned that way.

Tom's knack for turning a problem into a party, for zoning in on detail and pulling staff together for a team effort, can be summed up when he told me . . . "we are here to entertain the public. This is a service industry and the Van Dyck needs to get back to basics, and do just that."

The new front-end manager, who has been welcomed back by employees as well as customers also said . . . "the doors are opened to any ideas that Stockaders have, this club is their neighborhood jewel. They should

feel as comfortable as if they were in their own back yard." (I smiled at this because I have always felt, the beautiful Stockade shares the same back door with all the exceptional music I have heard at the historical Van Dyck).

It does get discouraging for Rynasko, as well as bar manager Cindy Moynihan and longtime barkeep Eric Stathis, because only one out of ten people hired to go through training stay to execute the high standards that are now maintained by Tom. He reminded me of what a huge operation the Van Dyck is: a restaurant, a tavern, a brewery, a banquet house and a music club that books and promotes international as well as local musicians. Still he feels confident, with the help of many hard working people, there will be a professional team to run the daily business of the Van Dyck. Stop in and say "hello" and catch all that's brewin'.

Thinking of Doing Some Spring Outside Home Repairs?

You may need to file an Application to The Schenectady Historic Commission

All of our homes are part of the city's Stockade Historic District. As such we are bound by the city's codes and regulations regarding such districts.

If in any way what you are proposing is to change any aspect of the exterior appearance of your house, yard or property that can be seen from any public street, alley or sidewalk, it requires review by the Historic Commission. The Commission meets once a month on a Monday night to publicly review applications. An application, supporting materials and photos, need to be submitted. Some applications, such as for simple roofing or repainting projects, can be reviewed by the city's planning department without a formal Commission review. Applications and further information are available from Christine Slovak or Tony Tozzi in the Department of Development, Room 14, 105 Jay Street, City Hall, Schenectady, 12305, 382-5147 or 382-5054. Fees for Historic Commission applications are \$10 for residential applications and \$20 for commercial applications. Deadlines for 2003 are as follows:

• Ron Chard and his garden are famous? It's all in Better Homes and Gardens "Simply Perfect Small Gardens 2003" issue of the magazine. The table of contents describes it as "understated elegance . . . certainly doesn't have a Versailles size lot but King Louis XIV inspired him to turn his tiny New York garden an antique showcase in which formal urns play a leading role." Inside are ten pages of gorgeous photos with detailed descriptions of the 20 x 50 garden at 16 N. Church St. The Stockade itself is described as "old world elegance of eight square blocks of Victorian style town houses along the Mohawk River!" The garden was designed with Ron by landscape gardener Mark Fisher. The effect is that overdone look Ron loves, jammed but tasteful, and so unique it made the cover photo! I didn't read a word about weeds.

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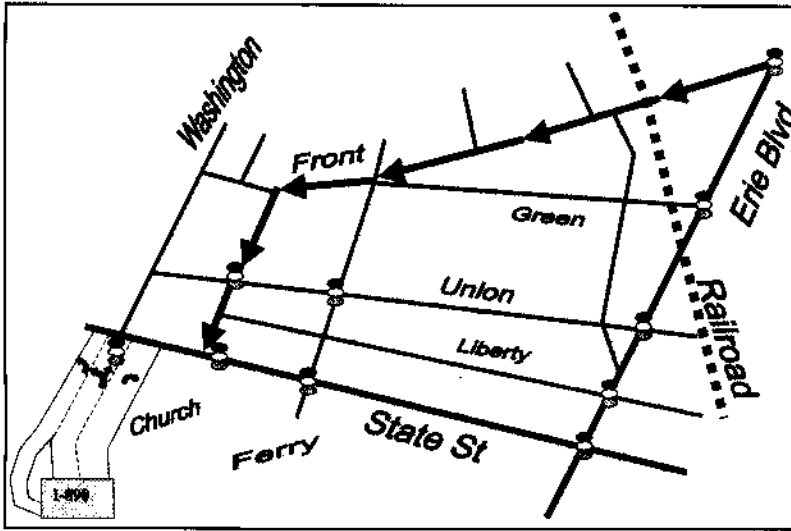
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Racing through the Stockade? Can you suggest a way to stop it?

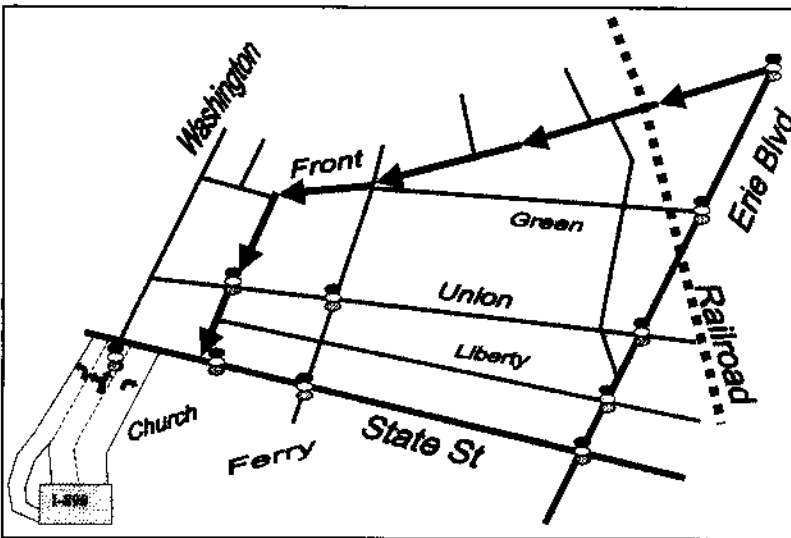
Shortcut through the Stockade: East to West

The arrowed line shows how a driver can go from Front and Erie to State and Church with only one stop sign and a single stoplight at Church and Union – the alternative of staying on Erie and State adds 5 stoplights.



Shortcut through the Stockade: West to East

The arrowed line shows how a driver can go from State Street, usually directly from the high-speed of 890, to Erie Blvd. and Front (via Washington, Front, Green, College, Front), avoiding 6 stop signs and heavy traffic. Alternately, some enter the Stockade on Church, drive north to Front, then follow the same path as above.



Has the Stockade become a version of the Daytona 500, with cars racing through our streets?

Hurrying non-residents have a timesaving reason to use Stockade streets: They can miss 5 or 6 stoplights from Rte 890 to Freeman's Bridge Road. How? It's simple: Go straight ahead at SCCC, speed down Washington, spin right onto Front, race past the Indian, hurry out Green Street, and save gobs of time. A comparable route in the other direction offers non-residents a speedier way from Freeman's Bridge to SCCC, a way to avoid five stoplights.

Reproduced here are two maps identifying the routes and showing the number and location of stoplights these drivers can miss. They have been prepared by Dale Miller of Green Street and have been studied at length by the Stockade Board of Directors.

The Board has been wrestling with the nightmare of speeding drivers for months. We have looked at maps and walked the streets. Eli Taub counted as 27 consecutive cars ran the stop sign on Front Street at the Indian. Joe Fava has watched cars speed past the Indian with no apparent regard for pedestrians. Susannah Sherwood has watched in disbelief as cars sped past her house on Front Street. Will one of us one day witness the accident we all fear?

We're not sure what changes to make to prevent this dangerous behavior. Better policing would help, of course, and we've requested that. Looking for a permanent fix, we have considered closing Washington Ave. at SCCC or closing the circle around the Indian so the shortcuts no longer work. We haven't so far found a solution that doesn't produce resistance. (More discussion appears in the Board minutes elsewhere in this *SPY*.)

We continue to work on the problem, and would welcome input from neighbors. Do you share our concern? Do you worry about speeders? Have you an idea that would solve the problem? Please contact a Stockade Board member – their names and addresses are listed in the masthead – and let us know. Or come to our next general Stockade Association meeting.
