Steinmetz: "The Wizard of Schenectady"

Do you recognize the 1840's house pictured below? It's located at 53 Washington Avenue, one of many significant properties listed in the National Register of Historic Places, "Stockade Historic District." How many of you have stopped to read the plaque?

Steinmetz's 1st Schenectady home
53 Washington Avenue

In 1894, Charles Proteus Steinmetz, rented an apartment in this house soon after starting to work in Schenectady at the General Electric Company. Even at 29, he was known for his accomplishments in mathematics and grew into renowned in the new field of electrical engineering and later teaching at Union College.

Shortly after moving in, he welcomed two additional young "bachelors" to share the "pad." The house was within walking or bicycling distance to the GE facility - one could safely cross State Street then since it dead-ended at Washington Avenue. Proteus and Ernst J. Berg, his friend and colleague over the next 30 years, added Ernst's brother,

Eskil, also from Sweden, to make up the threesome who shared expenses, common recreational interests and a "Bohemian" lifestyle. The relatively new immigrant (Steinmetz arrived at Ellis Island in 1889) simply called the household members "family."

While working so hard at creating electrical apparatus, Steinmetz maintained a rich and active social life full of friends, cards, and practical jokes. Ernst J. Berg wrote in 1934 that "it seems extraordinary that so much real work was done because we played so much." During those first years in Schenectady, Steinmetz and his friends got into "all kinds" of mischief, according to Berg. "Sometimes we would be busy at night shifting signs so that in the morning the dispenser of beer would find a dry goods sign over his door and vice versa." (Quoted from Union College Magazine, Fall 1998: Volume 91, Number 2). Later, the fun times (and work) shifted to "Camp Mohawk" in the Town of Glenville. SCCC Community Archaeology Program students are currently researching this Steinmetz hideaway and compiling data on its physical appearance and location. If anyone in the

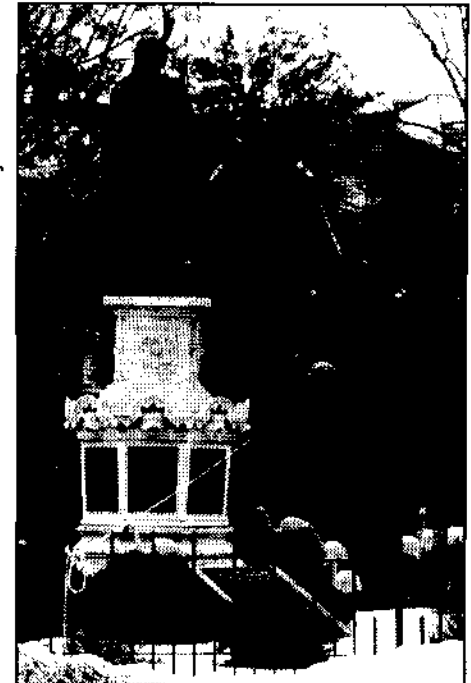

Stockade Association Board Meeting Minutes February 1, 2005

Present: Joe Fava, Debbi Douglas, Diane DeMeo, Lyn Gordon, Dale Miller, Peter Rumora, Bob Preville, Connie Colangelo, Eli Taub, Brad Fisher and Fred Kindl. Sylvie Briber, Kim Mabee, Jennifer Wells, Stan Hickok, Ellen Desmond and Steve Kowalski were present as guests.

Joe called the meeting to order at 7:10pm.

Connie made a motion to approve the minutes of the January board meeting. Fred seconded the motion, which passed unanimously.

Treasurer's Report/Budget

Lyn presented the treasurer's report, and after discussion, Eli made a motion to accept the report. Connie seconded the motion, which passed unanimously.

Current Business

501 C3 Status

Stan Hickok has been generously volunteering his time to work on the Association's tax exempt status. He briefed the board in detail on the background work he has done, from our initial application for the 501 C3 status, probable reasons for its suspension and the steps that are required to reinstate the status. Eli made a motion that Stan be given authority to, together with Lyn, file the forms necessary to reinstate our 501 C3 status. Connie seconded the motion, which passed unanimously. The board again thanked Stan for generously volunteering his time and knowledge to get the Association back on track.

Sidewalk and Painting Incentive Program

Brad reported that the finance committee met to review the fiscal viability of continuing the program. With strong support from the membership to keep the program, Brad made a motion to restrict combined sidewalk and painting incentives to \$2,000 maximum for the 2005-2006 budget, the expenditures to be offset by increased dues income raised in fundraising categories described (above base membership fees), with any surplus being directed 50% to reserve, and 50% to neighborhood improvement. Eli seconded the motion, which passed unanimously. In discussion, Eli mentioned that we have not yet exceeded the \$2,000 in the history of the program. Brad also discussed various ideas to expand the membership revenue to support the program, including increased membership fees, different membership classifications and sponsorship opportunities. The incentives will be awarded

on a first-come, first-serve basis, and the program will be revisited annually to determine its fiscal viability for the following year.

Garden Group

Steve Kowalski and Ellen Desmond were invited to the meeting to discuss incorporating the garden group back into the Association. They had a long list of questions to pose to the board, and a very good discussion ensued. Steve and Ellen will report back to their group, and further progress will be reported.

Website

Jennifer Wells was invited to the meeting to discuss our website, its use and benefits. Jennifer mentioned that she is always looking for ideas, articles, photos, event updates and links to other sites. Bob Preville will start posting *The Spy* each month, and Jennifer will print out pages of the website for the board to review and brainstorm for ideas. The board thanked Jennifer for all of her efforts to compose and maintain the website that showcases our neighborhood.

Master Plan

Dale reported that there will be a master plan brainstorming session at the Historical Society on March 2nd. All members are invited and encouraged to attend.

By-Laws

Eli presented the board with draft changes to the by-laws. A discussion of some of the proposed changes took place, and the Board will review the final draft in March. An informational presentation/question/answer exchange for the Association will take place at the General Membership meeting in March.

There being no further business to discuss, Brad made a motion to adjourn. Deb seconded the motion, which passed unanimously. The marathon concluded at 10:05.

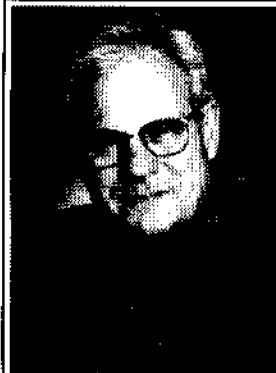

Many birds communicate through simple sounds including some they make mechanically without using their voice. Many species depend on non-vocal sounds to communicate. Woodpeckers drum against hollow parts of trees to advertise their territoriality and to attract mates. If hollow trees are not available, a variety of other objects will suffice, including air vents, metal chimneys, and other parts of buildings. I've watched a Yellow-bellied Sapsucker drum on a metal ladder. When Sapsuckers drum it sounds almost like morse code.
