County Clerk, John Woodward, Talks of Rich Records

A chat with John Woodward, who describes himself as an "amateur historian," reveals him to be a high energy, passionate man - passionate about Schenectady and its rich abundance of history, records, and resources.

If you have never been to the County Clerk's office, and are fascinated by history, or are researching your house, you must go! You will be greeted by friendly staff who will help you navigate your way through the many large volumes, microfilm and copy machines.

On Saturday, October 8, at 1:30 PM, at the Schenectady County Historical Society, 32 Washington Avenue, John Woodward will be telling you all about what the County Clerk's office contains. They just now have census records dating back to 1835 to

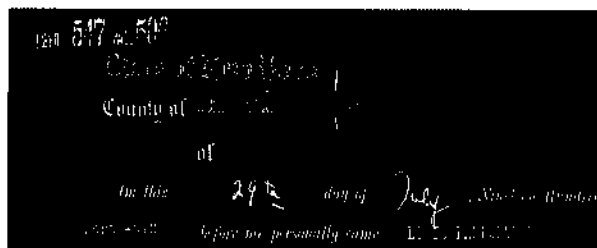
the present. And they now have deeds prior to 1809 (when Schenectady was part of Albany County) that before now were only available in the Albany Hall of Records. They also have 13,000 maps!

The office is presently scanning all naturalization papers and hopes to have many records digitalized, and on the internet.

John recalls the story of his great joy when a man had driven to the County Clerk's office all the way from Michigan to research a tract of land in his family. When he found the treasure he had been seeking, he exclaimed that his long drive had indeed been worth it!

John is also co-chair with County Historian, Don Rittner, of the 2009 County Bicentennial Committee.

Stockade Association General Meeting Minutes September 8, 2005

President Joe Fava called the meeting to order at 7:05. Eli Taub introduced guest speaker **County Historian Don Rittner**, and the group welcomed him by singing happy birthday! Don introduced himself and began by describing his background, and how Larry Hart became to be one of his mentors, and how early on in his career, Don helped mark the Kings Highway. Launching into his presentation, Don outlined the project that he is spearheading called "**Schenectady Underground**". He described how a collection of artifacts from this area has been compiled in the Netherlands, and will be on display in a traveling exhibit in Albany in 2006. The exhibit will also tour the country, and Don is still searching for a location in Schenectady to hold the display. Part of the exhibit will be a replica of the first Dutch ship built in America in 1614 called the *Onrust*. He is hoping eventually this will become a "floating ambassador" of the Mohawk. He then went on to describe heritage tourism projects in cities around North America, and the success these cities are achieving by capitalizing on preserving their heritage. After a brief Q and A session, Joe and the membership thanked Don for his presentation.

In association business, Bob Briber made a motion to accept the **minutes** from the general meeting in May. Beth Petta seconded the motion, which passed unanimously. Lyn presented the **treasurer's report**, which is also available for review by members. She listed the **expenditures** since May, and the **bud-**

get outlines the income/expenses since the last budget. Peter Rumora made a motion to accept the treasurer's report. Bob Briber seconded the motion, which passed unanimously. Peter Rumora then outlined the **budget for 2005/2006**, stating that it is available for the members' review.

In committee news, Joe reported that the **art show** slated for this weekend is still in need of volunteers. Lyn reported that the **Walkabout** is on schedule for September 24th, and aside from the house tours, will feature live music, carriage rides, trolley rides, boat rides, food vendors and nearly twenty crafters in the park. Joe mentioned to the group that this event has been in planning stages for one year, and of course, we always welcome new volunteers to help out with this ever-expanding event. Representing the **membership committee**, new committee chair Elena Alvarez outlined the idea to mail membership renewal forms to current members, and to mail sign-up forms to prospective members. These forms will also solicit ideas from the neighbors regarding prospective neighborhood improvement. Regarding the **master plan**, Dale Miller presented ideas for a new Stockade logo. The new logo will be used on entrances to the Stockade, on street signs, and on historic home plaques. The membership briefly discussed the prospective ideas, and the board will update as progress is made.

With no further business to discuss, Diane DeMeo made a motion to adjourn. Peter seconded, and the meeting was unanimously adjourned at 9:30.

Our total artist exhibitors in this years show was 114

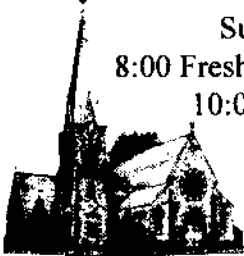
Returning artists	75

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Sidewalks of the Stockade

Since I purchased my home on Green Street in February 2004, I've been painfully aware (literally - I've tripped numerous times) that I must attend to the sidewalk. A huge, messy linden tree has flexed its roots over the years and raised portions of the sidewalk to unwelcoming 45-degree ramps. But more immediate priorities - a new roof and other repairs - have drained funds from my Home Account. Until now.

The massive linden, of course, had to come down. But how? The situation resembled a Catch-22 dilemma: if I spent money to have the tree taken down, I couldn't afford a new sidewalk. But I couldn't have a new sidewalk put in until the offending tree was removed.

Schenectady Park Supervisor Ray Vacca came to the rescue. He and his tree surgeon determined that the huge linden was rotting from the inside (as evidenced by a finger-full of black goop scraped from an opening in the trunk). Good news (for me, not the tree), since I had been told that EnCon will not permit the City to remove healthy trees. So a large day-glo orange "X" was spray-painted on the trunk, along with a companion mark on the curb, and a verbal caution that it might "take a while" to have the tree removed.

In retrospect, the signs of the ailing tree should have been obvious to me. This past spring, its blossoms were double the quantity of last year's bounty, and the tree sprayed sap on my parked car for months. The glue-like nectar caused bees, flies and dirt to adhere to the car's exterior. Every morning, my poor grey Saturn resembled an Alfred Hitchcock movie. The bees were strong enough to escape their sticky prison, but the poor flies stuck fast and died. Car wash super-

visors shook their heads in disbelief, ran my car through their establishments twice, and gave me coupons for more free washes. I had read long ago, that just before a tree dies, it makes a huge final gasp of fertility. A last stab at life rained from my big linden on unaware objects below it for months.

It should be noted that sidewalks in the Stockade are regulated to a degree. They may be fashioned out of slate, brick, tinted concrete, or some combination of the three. A plan must be written and submitted to the Historic District Commission, after which the home-owner must attend a hearing. In preparation, I studied the walkways of Front Street and North Ferry, Green Street and North Church. Regardless of location, my favorite was always slate flanked by bricks in a herringbone pattern (see photo). And so it shall be, if I can adequately juggle the money, materials, and mason, and secure the blessings of the Commission and Mother Nature.

Two other aspects worth mentioning. Although I don't have the details, I am told that ReTree Schenectady will help replace the downed tree with a new one - something suitable for a space located beneath utility wires. And there's a lovely little sidewalk incentive of up to \$300 awarded by the Stockade Association. While Stockade residents are gently reminded to spruce up their properties before events



like the Villager Art Show and the Walkabout, the Association is also willing to "put its money where its mouth is" and reward those who make the effort to keep the Stockade the special community that it is, sidewalks and all.

A Little Financial Aid for Ailing Sidewalks & Painting

The Stockade Association has an incentive program to help neighbors with home improvements. A maximum of \$300 per property owner is available for sidewalks. For painting building exteriors readily visible from the public way, the maximum is \$150 per property owner. To be eligible, one must be a paid-up member of the Stockade Association for 2005-6. (See membership form page 3). All sidewalk and painting work must be approved by the Historic District Commission. (See page 9).

Vale Cemetery - Natural History Tour Sunday, October 9, 2:00 PM

The Vale Cemetery tour, Sunday, October 9, is devoted to the Natural History of this very large rural area in the heart of the City of Schenectady. You will find examples here that you had no idea existed in the heart of an industrial city. Our guide will be none other than Ruth Schottman, a graduate of Cornell University's School of Agriculture, who has a long and illustrious record in this region of teaching classes in Natural History in the Schenectady City School system adult education program, classes through the Schenectady Museum and who is a founding member of the Environmental Clearinghouse of Schenectady (ECOS). The Adirondack Mountain Club has published a book of plant essays which she authored.

Vale Cemetery, originally some 300 acres, was officially opened in 1857 as part of the Rural Cemetery Movement in the 19th century. Landscaping was done by a professional horticulturalist to enhance and incorporate the natural beauty of the Vale, its lakes and varied terrain.

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Birds of the Stockade

This summer, like many other summers past, we lived among the mourning doves. After we cut down one of two pine trees in our garden, we did wonder if they would still choose to visit the remaining tree, now not as safe as when they nested between the two trees. They surprised us and, to my great delight, even built a nest. With increased activity among the pine boughs, I found myself wondering more about them.

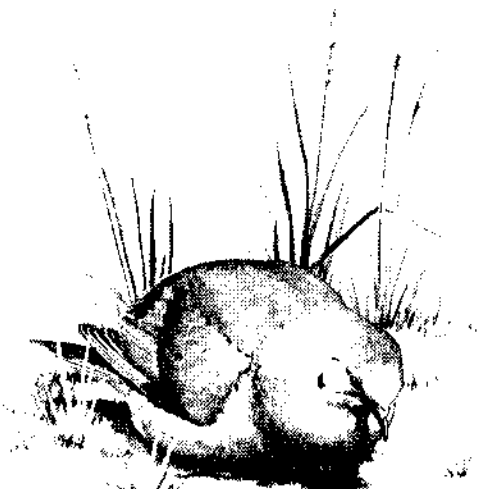
I had always enjoyed their coos, a sweet backdrop to my daily activities, a kind of song of the Stockade. But now with their animated presence, so close to our back door, I started with lots of questions. So I went to our resident Stockade bird expert, Jamie Taft, for answers. Jamie loaned me one of his favorite bird books, **A Guide to Bird Behavior**, by David Stokes.

Where did their strange name of "mourning" come from?" It is from their sad, plaintive-sounding call. They do have two basic calls: the long-coo and the short-coo. The long-coo is done mostly by unmated males in their effort to attract a female. It consists of five to seven notes. The second note is stressed, and higher pitched than the others. The short-coo is just like the first three notes of the long-coo. This call is given by the male when calling the female to the nest site during nest-site selection or during nest-building. The female may give this call to the male while she is on the nest. It can also be given during courtship or after territorial conflicts.

These sweet birds seem to know us and don't fly away when we are around. Do they come back to the same spot year after year? Yes, they are permanent residents.

Mourning Dove

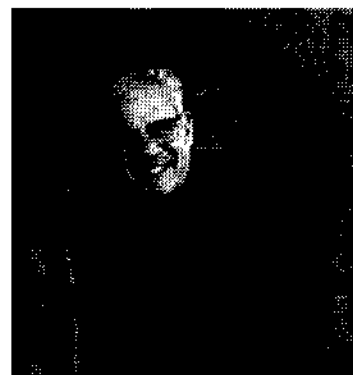
