Minutes

Stockade Association General Meeting January 12, 2005 Schenectady County Historical Society

President Joe Fava called the meeting to order at 7:35 pm; about 40 people were present. Joe asked Fred Kindl to introduce Frank Gilmore, Stockade neighbor and member of the architectural firm of Stracher-Roth-Gilmore.

Frank, aided by slides, described an urban rebuilding project on 5 1/2 acres in the East Front Street area. The development team, well regarded by city officials, consists of a number of local firms with many different capabilities.

Frank described in detail the 80 or so residential properties planned for the project, which will echo many of the qualities of the Stockade, New "mews" housing, duplex townhouses and other market-rate housing will join a number of renovated homes - some of which go back to the 19th century - plus local thru streets, trees, pedestrian access to seasonal docking facilities and other attractive, river oriented facilities. Frank said the city offered 219 Front St for \$1 as an incentive to develop the area - now composed of many different properties - and has been very helpful. He said the involved neighbors have been very cooperative and that Steve Strichman of the City has been particularly supportive. Frank answered questions and was applauded warmly.

The minutes of the Association general meeting of November 11, 2005, were accepted as reported in the SPY, and Lyn Gordon's Treasurer's report was accepted. She reported that since that earlier meeting the Association has had expenses of \$9807 and income of \$9008, leaving a balance in our checking account of \$16,484. The Walkabout realized a net income of \$4755, a very good return. The total financial assets of the Association are \$42,343.29.

• Lyn reported on encouraging progress toward next year's Walkabout. The planning group plans to extend the children's entertainment area, and is looking actively for houses to feature in the event. Suggestions were sought from the group. • Diane DeMeo reported on Kerst Kermis, the craft fair held on the day of the tree lighting, which this year netted \$985.25. A planning meeting for next year's event will be held shortly. • Joe - in Peter Rumora's absence - described the free brunch to be held from 11 to 1 on

February 12 in the Civic Players' building. Everyone is warmly encouraged to attend, and those choosing to do so can bring in baked goods for the assembled crowd that morning as early as 9 am. • Dale reminded the group of the City Master Plan meeting at 6:30 pm on Jan. 24 at 6:30. He said he would put the results of the first of these planning meetings on his Yahoo site. • The group was also reminded of the information meeting about the Gilboa dam at 6:30 pm on 1/17/06 in City Hall. • Fred described the plans for the March 9 general meeting of the Association, a "brainstorming" session, so members of the Association can describe the directions in which they would like to see the Association proceed.

Jack MacDonald reported that he has heard the 185 residents of the YMCA will stay there as the YMCA's other services are moved to the "Big N" site. The group discussed the issue at length, and unanimously passed a motion (moved MacDonald, seconded Kishton) saying that "the Stockade Association supports having the YMCA residency program move out of its present building. The building should be renovated for other uses such as housing for SCCC students."

Carmella Ruscitto spoke about the "Neighborhood Watch" program, and asked for volunteers to help a couple hours a week. She said the requirements are not at all difficult; they can be carried out, for example, while walking the dog - but police respond very quickly when alerted by the participants. Jennifer Wells said she had names of people who said they would work with the program when they joined the Association.

The meeting was adjourned a 9:00 pm.

Memory seems to unlock some creative doors for me, and so when the word "Greece" was mentioned at lunch a few days ago, my mind filled itself with images from a distant past.

There were fragrant chickens slowly turning on a spit, their skins stuffed with lemon slices in a tavern on a narrow street in Panormo, a fishing village on the north coast of Crete. We'd come to this place by ferry from the mainland to Heraklion, and then by car. Silver Olive groves and herds of sheep on the drive. And why we settled in that town I can't remember. But it was close to the sea and there was a beach for swimming. It was not a tourist place and there were no shops except to buy food and a general store with a telephone. Siesta was at two in the afternoon and people got up again around four to go back to work, or to have a drink outdoors in the square.

We took an excursion one day to Chania (pronounced Hannah) the capitol of Crete to shop and see the ancient harbor, its stone pillars rising from the sea and filled with boats of brilliant colored sails. In a restaurant our appalling Greek was ignored as we were

taken to the kitchen to choose our fish from ice-packed drawers. Our dinner was accompanied by potatoes fried in the local olive oil. Cheese was only sheep's cheese and very creamy.

I remember fish jumping out of the sea and a man with a brazier roasting chestnuts. No dogs on the island. Only sheep dogs and seeing-eye dogs. But hundreds of cats prowling around. Thin and hungry.

It only rains in Crete in January. The rest of the time it is sunny and about sixty degrees. No humidity. Perfect for olives. Humans too.

Nice to sit with my coffee on this gray, wet day a million miles from the Aegean and the sun. Isn't it wonderful to have memories? To slow the pace a little, to pause, and remember?

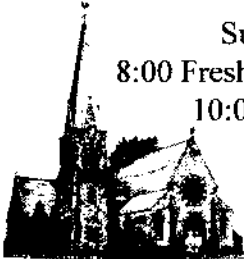

Front Street Antiques

There's no challenge shopping at Macy's or Walmart's. Everything is totally predictable. But mosey down Front Street (sometime between 9 am and 1 pm), under the railroad bridge toward Erie Boulevard, as I did one uncharacteristically warm day recently, and you might notice a white façade on the right with a large "OPEN" sandwich board on front step. You've just discovered one of the best kept secrets on the outskirts of the Stockade: Front Street Antiques.

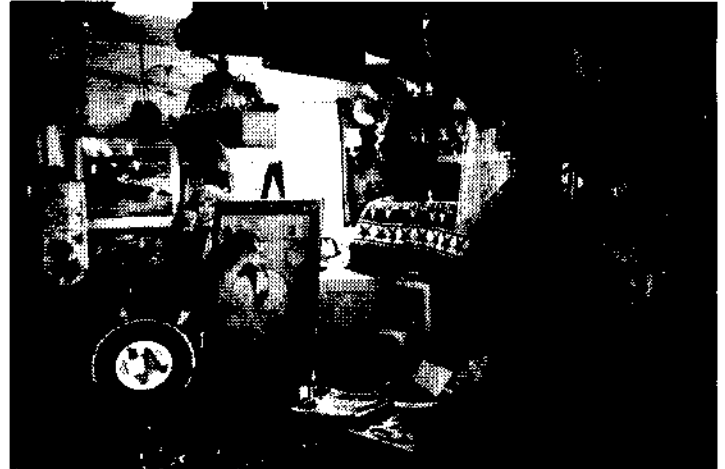
"You really need a sign, Lillian," I said to proprietor Lillian Goodspeed. "I'm working on it," she replied, "but I didn't want the nails to cause rust spots on the new exterior," she explained.

For ten years, Lillian has worked at the Front Street establishment, its sole proprietor for the last five. After a stint at running a day-care business, she began buying box lots from auctions. She stripped and caned furniture for a while, read lots of books, and gave birth to Front Street Antiques.

Besides tending the store from 9-1 Tuesdays through Saturdays, Lillian brings her vintage treasures to the Brimfield (MA) Antiques Show each summer (this year: May 9-14 • July 11-16 • September 5-10). One year, she adorned her table with 5000 salt and pepper shakers!

But you can find more than shakers in this unique emporium. In the brief time I inhabited the store, I noted vintage clocks, radios, cameras - and an enamel bedpan. Lillian has collections of photos, posters, paintings, lps, glassware, toys, dishes, jewelry and hats. I left the shop with an ornate pewter (I think) creamer, sugar bowl and larger bowl set, engraved with my initial "E." I also purchased four pressed glass berry bowls, a creamer, two small punch cups, and a spatula-like utensil with a copper handle for which I have absolutely no use but love. I must add that I still had money in my pocket. No items are priced, but everything is reasonable - so much so that I heard no bartering done during the hour I was there.

During my visit, two "regulars" and a young couple



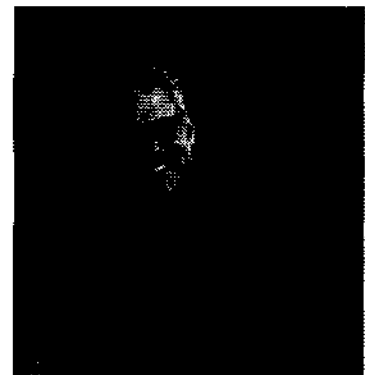
browsed the crowded aisles. Lillian adds items to her store daily, and she remembers what her customers collect. Gerald left the store with a life size cardboard standup of Glamour Girl Marilyn Monroe, while another gentleman was delighted with a baggie full of tiny plastic figures.

A life-long area resident, Lillian has 6 children, 14 grand children and an almost 6 year old great grandchild. Her roots are firmly established in Schenectady - as evidenced by her ever-growing, always changing little shop on Front Street.
