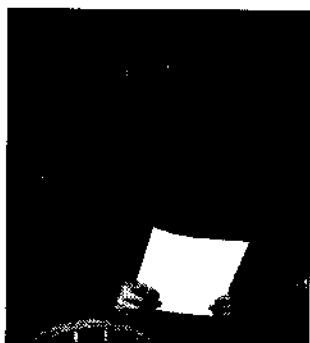

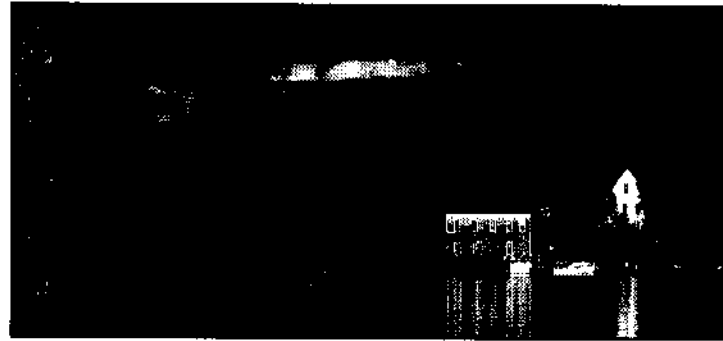

From the Board -

Last Spring the Association members created a list of priorities for the Board to consider and address. A year has passed and it is time to report back to the membership regarding our progress.

The number one priority was preservation. With that in mind the finance committee added a line item in the budget and put aside \$4,000 for that purpose. To date we have spent \$2,500 for construction drawings, which the Association owns, for 221 Green Street. Gloria Kishton has been addressing code enforcement and was instrumental in having the County clean up the property around the Gillette House. She and Joe Fava lobbied to have the City sell the property at the end of Ingersoll Ave. It has been sold to a couple who have turned it into a one family residence. 108 Union St. is in the process of being put back into the historic district and the Board is working with the owner to ensure the construction of condos rather than apartments in that building. The issue of the program proposed for the Mary Hill House is primarily a zoning issue and several Board members and neighbors have worked to see that the zoning laws are enforced for this property.

The second priority expressed by the members was to have a co-op grocery in the Stockade. Your president is in negotiations with the new owners of Arthur's to ensure that he understands the need for such a store in the neighborhood.

Our sidewalks are of great concern and we have a pilot program with the City to replace sidewalks on one of our streets.

Joe has been working with the City to establish a better snow plan and is working on a plan for emergencies such as flooding whereby only the electricity to endangered homes will be shut off rather than to the entire street.

Our communication with the City has improved markedly since last Spring with increased cooperation by all concerned.

There was interest shown in returning the foot-

print of the historic Stockade to its original boundaries. Lyn Gordon and Schenectady's Historian, Don Rittner, under the direction of the Schenectady Heritage Foundation, have identified the properties that need to be brought back into the district and we are now working on getting the documentation needed to complete the project.

You asked for water in the park. With the cooperation of the Garden Group we now have water in the park.

You asked for historic repairs advice. If you visited the Walkabout last September you would have found a large tent occupied by contractors in the area ready to answer your questions. They will be back this in greater numbers. Take their cards for future reference.

Cooperation with churches: Rev. Bill Levering, the new minister at the First Reformed Church, will speak at the May General Meeting, concerning his vision as to the Church's role in the neighborhood in the future. St. George's fence is in the process of being repaired and both churches cooperated with the parking problem during our two big storms this winter.

There was an interest in establishing a neighborhood watch. The meeting of all those who signed up was held at Arthur's on April 10 with Lt. Brian Barnes leading the workshop.

Park upkeep and beautification - the Garden Group has taken a leadership role with this and the Parks Dept. At the urging of the Board, they have mowed more often, emptied trash and cleaned the esplanade. We are working to have a new foot path placed by the end of the summer. At this writing it is not definite, but we are working on it.

These are the highlights of the work that the Board has addressed in the last year. I'm proud to sit on such a hard working Board and am always pleased to see the result of our efforts.

The untold number of hours spent in meetings to bring these changes about cannot be over emphasized.

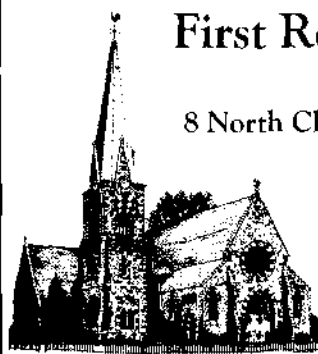

The following is a summary of the **April 3, 2007 Stockade Association Board Meeting** prepared by Carol DeLaMarter.

The meeting was called to order by Joe Fava at 7:05pm. Members present heard from guest Reza Mahoutchian owner of 108 Union/111 Liberty Street property (formerly MVP). He has plans to convert building to residential units and has submitted an application to the ZBA for variance. A public hearing of ZBA on the application is scheduled for April 4. Mr. Mahoutchian answered many of the Board questions about his proposal.

The Board continued discussion and passed a resolution (two abstentions) from the Board stating support for his effort to preserve historic 108 Union St. and encouraging his pursuit of funding options such as condos to assure stable ownership of any residential development at that location. The Stockade Association continues to support the effort to have 108 Union added to the Stockade Historic District.

The Treasurer's report from Lyn Gordon was accepted. Members of the Mary Hill House Committee and the attorney retained by the Stockade Association

will present comment against the YWCA application for change in use variance to property on Washington Ave. at the April 4th ZBA public hearing.

The Nominating Committee chaired by Mary D'Alessandro presented a list of officers and Directors to be voted on at May 10th Annual Meeting of the Stockade Association.

Board has been asked to be part of the Patronal Festival of St. George's Church on Sunday, May 6th. Board members will participate in neighborhood procession and luncheon if available.

Beverly Elander announced Neighborhood Watch volunteers will meet on Tuesday, April 10 at Arthur's for orientation and training. All board members were encouraged to participate.

Gloria Kishton updated Board on status of Jay St. Historic District. Board unanimously approved resolution of support for application establishing Jay St. Historic District.

Peter Rumora provided information on the Verizon cables that have been installed on several blocks in the neighborhood.

Meeting was adjourned at 9:45pm.

So if you are expecting friends or relatives to visit you, the English Garden Bed and Breakfast just may be their cup of tea!

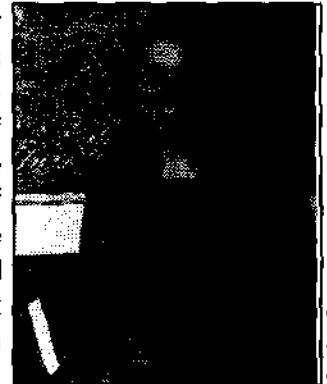

AKA Captain Eagle Eyes

James (Jamie) L. Taft was given this moniker during one of his 13 summers working as a teacher of ornithology at an Audubon Camp on Hog Island, Maine. While on a boat trip near camp, the captain of the boat was talking about lobstering, but Jamie was busy scanning the island with binoculars. Suddenly, he spied the white head of

a Bald Eagle, and the captain, impressed with Jamie's visual acumen, dubbed him "Captain Eagle Eyes." The name stuck.

Since the age of 8 or 9 when Jamie first became fascinated by birds, feeding them in the small NH town where he grew up, he has observed over 20 Bald Eagles, including one last December in a tree across the river in Scotia. Also included in his "rare sightings" was a Great Partridge last year in Malone, NY and a Northern Hawk Owl in Root, NY. Jamie has had an occasional view of a Turkey Vulture, as well as a King Eider in Maine ("where he wasn't supposed to be but was there anyway").

Carrying a copy of the National Geographic

Field Guide to the Birds of North America to our interview, Jamie admitted to owning at least a dozen other bird books in his personal library, including an autographed copy of a guide by well-known ornithologist Roger Tory Peterson, first instructor at the Hog Island Audubon camp, whom Jamie met in Florida in 1995.

Captain Eagle Eyes' remembers that his first column for the *Stockade Spy* was about goshawks and was published in 1999. Although he doesn't have an "official" article in this issue, he offered Stockaders some seasonal suggestions:

- This is a good time to gradually cut down on feeding our feathered residents, so they can begin pursuing their natural diet.
- Listen for the songs of both male and female Cardinals. They sing the same song, but with different variations.
- Warblers will begin to show up in backyards this month, and the tree swallows will initiate nesting in bird boxes.
- Look for the Yellow-Bellied Sapsucker who will be passing through on its migration from the South to areas farther north.

And finally, Jamie's suggestion for anyone interested in birds: "Keep your eyes and ears open for anything!"

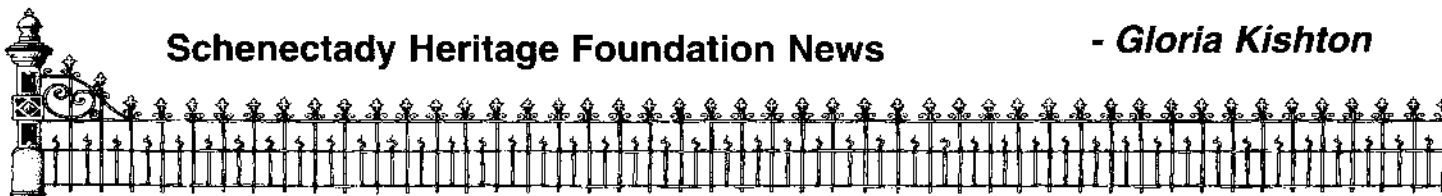

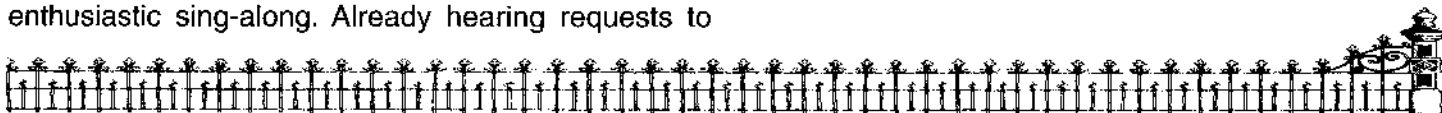
