Update from City Hall LED Street Lights on Union

National Grid and the City of Schenectady have replaced 18 high-pressure sodium streetlights with energy-efficient Smart LED lights on Union Street between North College Street and Washington Avenue. The new LED streetlights include a mixture of soft-white (3000 kelvin) and daylight temperature (4000 kelvin) bulbs.

National Grid and the City will be issuing a **community survey** for all local residents, business owners, and other stakeholders to gather feedback from the community on LED color preference and to use this guidance as a model for the rest of the project. In addition, the City will be hosting neighborhood meetings and informational sessions to gather additional feedback.

Under this Smart City REV Demonstration Project, the City of Schenectady will see energy savings and reduced maintenance from advanced street lighting and controls and improved performance of existing streetlights. Continuing in 2019, National Grid will use its LED Conversion program to replace approximately 4,200 of the remaining streetlights across the City over three years.

In case you missed it the Stockade Historic District was runner up in the **Gazette 2018 Best of the Best People's Choice** awards in the museum category. The November 7, 2018 Board Minutes were approved and Mr. Lemmerman gave the Treasurer's Report. Ms. DeLaMarter gave an update on a City Hall survey of LED lights; and a request from the YWCA for a meeting the week of January 14, 2019. The board agreed to set up a meeting on January 19, 2019.

Standing Committee Reports

Infrastructure Maintenance - Suzanne Unger gave an update on the Streetscape Project. There will be a streetscape committee meeting on December 19 to plan for the January 17, 2019 public input meeting.

Finance - Bob Lemmerman discussed a sidewalk incentive application. MOTION: To allocate \$500 to Greg Gufari to pay for installation of a new sidewalk at 150 Front Street as outlined in his April 2018 application. The motion passed on a vote of nine to two. Bob Stern suggested the board clarify how work will be paid in the future and that it must be paid before the end of the current fiscal year.

Historic Preservation and Zoning-Pump Station - Ms. DeLaMarter reported that a letter by attorney William Hurst was sent on Monday, December 3 to the Governor's Office of Storm Recovery (GOSR). Ms. DeLaMarter will be in touch with GOSR about the next steps to be taken. The board agreed that the attorney should proceed with the same letter to HUD if it does not incur further expenses.

Membership - The association needs to add and update members to SA membership group Mr. Stern, Mr. Lemmerman and Mr. Morgan will work on merging membership lists.

Committee on Safety - Colleen Macaulay reported on traffic issues.

Events Committee - Tavern Night at Brouwer House-Saturday, February 9, 2019. Program content and resources need to be determined.

Most of the birds that occur in and around the Stockade have different types of feet and beaks to help them survive. Raptors like the Bald Eagle have hook tipped beaks to help them tear prey and strong talons to grasp. While Northern cardinals have feet meant to perch and strong heavy seed eating beaks. Most birds have 4 toes, there are 2 species of woodpeckers that have 3.

"The Babylon Line," by Richard Greenberg and directed by Chris Foster, opens Friday, January 25, and plays through Sunday, February 3, 2019 at its 12 South Church Street Playhouse in Schenectady's historic Stockade district.

Dr. Alexa Cinque traces back more than just her own family roots as Cinque Chiropractic joins the Stockade Historical District in Schenectady.

Before Alexa Cinque became Dr. Alexa Cinque, her first job was at the Stockade Inn, another prominent historical building within the Stockade, located at 1 North Church Street, Schenectady. The Stockade drew in Dr. Cinque, with its warm and welcoming community, the history of the area, and the growth of downtown Schenectady. Dr. Cinque knew that this was the community she wanted to open her practice in. She is continuing to expand her practice by attaining her health practitioner certifications, integrating functional medicine, supplementation, and bio-individualized diet plans.

Planning on Changes to Your Historic District Property?

Physical changes to the exterior of property viewable from a public right of way (including parks and waterways) require proper approval from the Historic District Commission (HDC). Repairs or painting using like colors and materials do not require approval (but might still require a building permit). Applications at: cityofschenectady.com/195/development. Questions? Call 518-382-5147. The HDC schedule for the year is on the City's website. HDC reviews applications and then holds meetings on the fourth Thursday of the month at 7pm at City Hall.

Applications are due Three Mondays prior.

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
